

Attending my first BPW Leaders Summit in New York City was an incredible experience. By 1st VP Neelima Basnet's side, I had the opportunity to meet inspiring community members (like Cindy, Siobhan, Sweta and Carolyn from the AP region) on my and gain valuable insights from seasoned leaders. The Young BPW's vision for increasing visibility was particularly compelling. I also appreciated the breakout room format, which encouraged reflection and meaningful connections. A special highlight was discovering that past BPW President Susan O'Malley and I share an alma mater—Smith College. As the Class of '64, and the Class of '24, we had a wonderful, reminiscent conversation.

The summit was the perfect introduction to what to expect from CSW. I attended Parallel Events on the implementation of feminist frameworks in peace building process, including disarmament and resistance to fascism. One of the most thought-provoking discussions was the economic examination of the impact of unpaid household labor, typically performed by women, and its exclusion from GDP calculations. Given my interest in climate justice, I was especially drawn to sessions exploring the intersection of climate and gender, highlighting how natural disasters disproportionately affect women and children. The experience deepened my understanding of these critical issues and reinforced my commitment to sustainable, gender-inclusive solutions.
